| environment | all the surrounding conditions that affect a living thing | Protecting the environment has become the most important problem facing mankind. |
| equal | to be identical | It was an excellent competition between two equal competitors |
| equate | to consider as identical | After considering the offer I determined that both options would equate to the same outcome. |
| equipment | instrument(s) needed to perform a service | The medical industry is complaining that they do not have enough equipment. |
| erase | delete, remove or obscure something | The new information forced them to erase their former ideas and start again. |
| escape | break free from, leak as from a container, not noticed | Their only way to escape from catching the virus is to stay in your home. |
| especially | in a special way | Tall competitors are especially well-suited for long distance running. |
| establish | to set up permanently | It is very risky to establish a business in a foreign country. |
| estimate | a rough amount | The estimate that was given for the work was much higher than expected. |
| ethnic | of a given race or social group | When asked about his ethnic background the man replied that his ancestors were from Asia. |
| evaporate | to change a liquid into a gas | When water evaporates it leaves behind its mineral content. |

| event | a happening | Because of the virus outbreak the event had been canceled. |

| evidence | data on which a proof can be based | The evidence clearly shows that this man has committed a crime. |
| evil | morally wrong, bad | The jury had never before been exposed to such an evil person. |
| exact | complete agreement with reality | The fingerprints were an exact match. |
| example | a representative of one group | He was a fine example for others to follow. |
| except | not included | They were all on board the bus except for one student. |
| exchange | to give to, and receive from one another | The exchange students would trade places with students from another country. |
| excuse | to forgive, give a reason | The excuse the student gave for being late was that he could not find his shoes. |
| execute | to carry out, to perform | He was not able to execute on his tasks because of his broken leg. |
| exercise | systematic training | The doctor told him that through a routine exercise program he would regain the use of his leg. |
| exist | to be or live | It is not possible two identical people exist. |
| exit | the act of going out | When the fire alarm sounded, they all ran for the closest exit. |
| expand | to extend in one or more directions | She wants to expand her clothing business into another country. |
| expect | to consider something as probable | She did not expect such a high price for the license. |
| expense | money spent | The expense of starting the business was more than she could afford. |
| experience | the quantity of knowledge or skill that results from direct activity | The investors asked what previous experience she had in this industry. |
| experiment | a test to find out something | The experiment was focused on producing a new form of energy. |
| expert | a person highly knowledgeable | He is an expert in his field and people listen closely to his opinion. |
| explain | to make clear, to make plain | He tried to explain the concept but was unable to convince the investors. |
| establish | to set up permanently | She was able to establish her credibility to the audience. |
| estimate | a rough amount | The estimate was far short of the actual cost of the project. |
| explode | to burst or cause to burst suddenly and violently | Too much pressure in the container caused it to explode. |
| explore | to go or travel for the purpose of finding out about | He went to Africa to explore the jungle but he never returned. |
| export* | to sell out of one country for use in another | If you are able to export your product, the whole world is your market. |
| express | to put into words | Sometimes it is difficult to express our thoughts. |
| extend | to stretch out | The government decided to extend the benefit package for an additional six months. |
| extra | added to a regular quantity | The extra money from the government would help people to pay their bills. |
| extreme | of the greatest possible degree or intensity | It was an extreme action to take but everybody felt it was necessary. |
| eye | body part by which we see | The dog had one blue eye and one brown eye. |
